# **UPCOMING SATURDAY, DECEMBER 10TH WINTER WORKSHOP**

Check out the full lineup of classes offered at this year's Winter Workshop. Students will be assigned to classes based on teacher recommendation:

Jazz Improvisation with Randy Sabien: Randy will show students how to make any melody sound like "jazz." All students will participate in these classes separated by level.

Music and Movement with Valerie Blair: a Dalcroze-inspired class for beginners; students connect musical expression with physical movements; for students who are newest to their instrument.

Beginner's Open Mic.: beginning students will perform for each other in an informal and supportive format; for students who are newest to their instrument.

**Orff Improvisation** with Susan Mocarski: students will use Orff instruments for a unique introduction to improvisation; for all students not yet in a large ensemble.

Guitar & Piano Group Lessons: special group lessons for our more advanced piano and guitar students.

Orchestra: orchestra rehearsal for all students in a large ensemble.

# IMPROVISATION WITH MUSIC ACADEMY INSTRUCTOR DAVID NEWMAN

If you *google* "the benefits of improvisation," you will find an endless list of reasons to try musical improvisation including scholarly articles supporting its neurological benefits. Researchers have devoted significant energy into studying the brains of dedicated musical improvisers and have found substantial results; most notably, musical improvisation can deactivate parts of the brain associated with inhibition and activate parts of the brain responsible for self-expression including memory retrieval. If practiced regularly, improvisation can enhance our musical performances by helping us to be more present: while improvising, a musician is able to inhibit critical self-talk while accessing creative ideas more readily - both of which pave the way for more positive performance experiences. Even if we're not always improvising on stage, our performances benefit from the practice of it.

Trying to improvise can be difficult; we spend a great deal of time repeating passages in search of consistency and control. In order to try this skill, we must trust that our teachers will create a safe and encouraging space to do so. That's why we're excited to have heard that there's a bit of improvising going on in one of our teacher's studios: David Newman. We decided to ask him about it in order to help our students prepare for Randy Sabien's upcoming improvisation workshops.
